III. Agenda Item 1: CBI Discussion

- Slide 11: What are some ways clean energy could benefit people, especially people in Named Communities?
 - Participant: Consider what level of jobs are available: Are there programs that can support kids coming out of High School into training or certification programs? What are jobs that can be done at a high school level that can be created by Avista. CTE (Career and Technical Education). What are specific and technical training programs that would be needed.
 - **Avista:** Avista has an Equity, Inclusion, and Diversity group that provides specific technical training opportunities and access to programs for named communities.
 - Avista: Avista does offer training programs to high school students. Current 6 students are going through the program. There is a desire to expand the program to Othello.
 - Avista: Will do more work to see how they can propose a CBI.
- **Slide 11:** Thinking about the ways clean energy can benefit or unintentionally harm communities, what things could Avista measure or observe?
 - **Participant:** Economic incentives are always helpful. Finding ways to get information to customers directly. Making it as simple as possible would be better.
 - **Participant:** Putting information in people's bills.
 - Participant: Incorporate this kind of functionality into Avista App: "Rebate Tab", "Savings Tab". "People live on their phones now." "Apps are really good to affect people's behavior"
- Slide 12: What are some ways that people might be affected by clean energy?
 - \circ Avista: Avista is discussing breaking down: where Avista is serving
 - **Avista:** Avista is discussing resiliency in terms of accumulative impact of outages. Avista could potentially track this as a metric.
 - Avista: Avista has the data to do this, but it needs to be established whether this is an important metric.
 - Participants: No concerns were expressed.
- Slide 13: What are some ways that people might be affected by clean energy?
 - Avista: Jobs were a topic that kept coming up amongst participants during the June session. This is a case were Avista does not have the data but could purchase software that would allow them to track this data. This software, although, is very expensive.

- **Avista:** Further review indicates that participants care more about any job, including all utility jobs, and not just "Clean Energy".
- Avista ask to participants: Are there any other questions related to this jobs issue?
 - Participants: The diversity piece is important, and where jobs are being created "in the right places" (named communities, diverse communities)
 - Avista: Avista could do more work to see what kind of jobs are being offered in named communities, like craft jobs.
 - Avista: There is a special needs group in Spokane that Avista works with. Avista employs people with special needs and disabilities in a unique program at the Spokane Mission facilities.
 - Avista: Avista will commit to looking more into this jobs opportunity.
- Slide 14: What are some ways that people might be affected by clean energy?
 - Avista: Tracking school and educational visits would potentially be added to an existing metric.
 - **Participant:** Does Avista offer onsite visits?
 - Avista: No, Generally, if students are visiting, they are visiting a generation site. Avista also offers career fairs, Avista is visiting students and students are not visiting Avista.
 - **Participant:** If Avista goes to schools, Avista should make it fun.
- Slide 15:
 - **Avista:** There are some 70 metrics that are used by Avista and so after review, Avista would like to remove one regarding Green House Gases.
- Slide 16:
 - Avista: Avista would like to focus on Avista Green House Gases and dropping Regional Green House Gases
 - **Participant:** No questions from participants.
